The RBN Project Management Office is already two years down transformation lane, which is impacting the whole RBN. The aim of the transformation is to convert RBN to a project and programme management approach that increases efficiency and effectiveness.

The RBN PMO is also aligned with the strategy of meeting the needs of *Morafe* through monitoring the progress, cost and quality of projects and programmes implemented by RBN agencies.

PMO gives the leaders, community and managers in the RBN access to various levels of project and programme information.

Since PMO inception we have gone through a steep growing curve!

The Operations Room established its own dedicated website (www.rbnoperationsroom.com) to enable users to access information easily over the internet.

PMO follows the global trend of a virtual office environment. There is also a physical Operations Room inside the Civic Centre, where managers host project related meetings with access to information on all registered projects and programmes – this ensures a paperless meeting environment.

At the end of September 2011, **54 projects** were registered and active. A total of 162 registered projects were completed.

There were also **54 programmes** registered and active. We also increased public awareness of projects through the ability to send out SMS communication to all those registered in our database.

External interest in our systems and model is on the increase, which is evident from the website visitors (currently we stand on 1738 visits per month from 46 countries) and visits to the Operation Room.

RBN asset value increases, profit drops

The Royal Bafokeng Nation has accumulated assets worth R50.1billion from a mere R9.1billion in 2006.

This is according to the latest audited financial report presented to Morafe at a recent Kgothakgothe.

The report however paints a bleak picture on profits which have dropped to R4.7billion in 2010 from R6.9billion recorded in 2009. This is however a good sign of recovery from a loss of R1.4billion experienced in 2008.

The total asset value was boosted by among others, the listing of Royal Bafokeng Platinum Ltd on the JSE. In 2010 the RBN became the majority owner and operator of the Bafokeng Rasimone Platinum Mine.

RBN also increased its stake in Zurich Insurance Company from 10% to 25.1%. Zurich is the third-largest short-term insurer in South Africa.

The JSE-listed company provides short-term insurance products in both the domestic and commercial markets, transacting all classes of short-term insurance.

The RBN also acquired the 10% stake in Atterbury Investment Holdings. Atterbury focuses on two key areas, property and investment.

A 31.6% stake was acquired in the Eris Property Fund. Eris Property Group (Pty) Ltd (Eris) is also a property development and services group which provides a range of commercial property skills in the South African and sub-Saharan African markets.

RBN also acquired 5% of the Rand Merchant Bank. Rand Merchant Bank is a division of FirstRand Bank Limited, which is wholly owned by JSE-listed FirstRand Limited.

FirstRand provides banking and insurance products and services to retail, commercial, corporate and public sector customers in South Africa and several African countries. First National Bank and Wesbank are also divisions of FirstRand.

The acquisition of stakes in these significant and meaningful companies had led to a 147% increase in the consolidated revenue from R3.8b in 31 December 2006 to R9.4b in December 2010.

Summary of the Audited Financial Statement

- Group **assets** increased by 46% from R34.2 billion to R50.1 billion from December 2009 to 2010;
 - This was largely caused by:
 - The control and listing of BRPM Joint venture during October 2010, and
 - The accounting value of Implats increased by about 15% when compared to same period in 2009.
- Group **reserves** (net asset value) increased by 62% from R18.4 billion to R29.8 billion in line with asset growth;
- It is worth noting further that whilst there a decline in 2008 as a result of the financial crisis, the total reserves increased by a cumulative 282% from 2006 to 2010;
- The conversion of future royalties from Implats into equity is the largest contributor to this cumulative growth.
- Revenue includes all the income generated in the ordinary course of operating a business including those of investee companies;
- The acquisition of an increased interest in BRPM contributed largely to a 15% increase in **revenue** from R8.2 billion to R9.4 billion; and
- An increase of 147% was recorded when comparing 2010 to 2006 financial years.
- There was a decline in **net profit** of about 32% from R6.9billion to R4.7billion;
- There was a significant recovery of the 2008 drop in market values by about R5.1billion in during 2009;
- This compares to a recovery of only R132 million during the 2010 financial year.

The implementation of the December readiness plan will start from the beginning of December and run through to the first two weeks in the New Year.

“That to ensure that we render a much needed service and deal with the many calls which we receive during this busiest time of the year, all operational members of the EMS will be on duty throughout the festive season” explains Michel Kops EMRS Manager.

“Our call centre receives a vast number of emergency medical calls, which are promptly despatched to the relevant Ambulances.

A Medical Rescue Vehicle will be roving with a full set of "Jaws Of Life" Rescue tools to be used to free anyone trapped in a vehicle at an accident scene.

The RBN Health and Social Development Services in partnership with Royal Bafokeng Sports celebrated the elderly month with our senior citizens.

The department staged a soccer tournament sponsored by Xstrata Merafe, Siyakhula Trust, Royal Marang Hotel and Platinum Stars to acknowledge the elderly for their invaluable contribution to nation building.



Tsitsing stadium was filled with the trumpeting sounds of vuvuzelas on Friday 28 October, with the elderly people showcasing their football skills.

The senior citizens were organized into four football teams, with 25 players and two technical assistants from RBS.

In addition to coordinating all the Aged soccer teams, RBS offered their expertise in terms of

technical support, coaching and training. In total there are five teams but only three comprising of women aged between 60 and 70 took part in the tournament.

The teams from Phokeng, Tsitsing, Luka and Tantanana, were on top form as they provided the spectators with entertainment and good soccer.

The teams were allocated 50 minutes a game and neither their age nor the blazing heat deterred them from playing to the end.



After six hours of entertaining soccer games, Luka team took home the first ever cup of Bafokeng Aged soccer tournament after beating Tsitsing 5/4 in the finals. Other results, Tsitsing walloped Phokeng 6/0 and Luka beat Phokeng 2/0.

To align with National programmes for the elderly, RBA Health and Social development has developed Care for the Aged programme. Mamakie Mothiba, Manager HSDS, said the

programme was introduced to address the needs of older persons, celebrate their role in the society, and as an opportunity to lift many of them out of poverty and ensure their rights to dignified, productive, and healthy lives.

She said the tournament was a launch of South African National game and leisure (SANGALALA) a government initiative that promotes active ageing.



“Participation of our senior citizens in physical activity encourages good health, as well as bringing them together”, said Mamakie.

Mothiba appealed to the community to look out for the elderly and not isolate them from the society “Elderly people are a fountain of wisdom and we need to celebrate them for their invaluable contribution in the society”, she concluded.

Making a Difference in Cleaning up the Environment

Lebogang Ramorwa won an award at TEDCOR's Annual Community Contractor's Awards, held in Sandton, Johannesburg on 16 September.

The Community Contractor's Awards recognise contractors who have achieved excellence in delivery service to their communities.

Ramorwa was awarded with a trophy for his commitment and best results achieved during the Quality Management Survey, conducted earlier this year for the Royal Bafokeng Community Contractors.

He consistently went to extraordinary lengths to ensure that the region was cleared of refuse, making it a healthier and a more aesthetic environment in which to live. He makes sure that on collection days everyone's refuse is removed and recycled quickly and efficiently. His duties span a multitude of activities that include door-to-door collection services, removal of illegal dumping, street cleaning and litter picking.

In receiving the award on behalf of the company, Ramorwa said the award is just the start of great things to come as they intend to work even harder to earn more national awards. "We've done a lot

to get where we are today; we put great effort into this work.

"I've always wanted to be the best contractor and now I can see that our efforts are paying off", he said.

Ramorwa encouraged other local contractors involved in this waste management programme to pull up their socks and work harder, saying that this is the only way they can all compete in the national competitions.

He added that waste has negative impact on the environment, whether it's in the form of unsightly litter in streets or contaminated water.

He called on community members to try and minimize the impact of waste by not throwing trash everywhere and disposing waste in correct manner. He did, however, say that he is impressed with the cooperation they have received from the community, many of whom do their best to separate waste at source.

Tedcor's executive director, Victor

Nemukula says that the success of sustainable waste management lies in reducing the amount of waste that ends up in landfills.

There are presently over 1200 such sites in the country all of which are reaching their capacity.

"Reducing the amount of waste that goes into these sites can be achieved by efficient management, waste processing and recycling. Of course, sorting at source is incumbent on communities taking responsibility for recycling their waste. Royal Bafokeng is a shining example of this and the results speak for themselves", he said.

Over the last six years, Ramorwa's company Mamorara Landscaping has steadily grown from being just landscaping and garden service provider to incorporate refuse collection within the Bafokeng and the Mining area.

His wish is for the community to start taking the responsibility of paying for the waste collection service they receive in order to sustain the service.

Waste collection helps maintain clean and healthy environment

A year has passed since Royal Bafokeng Nation started operating a waste collection and disposal system serving approximately 20 000 households in the area.

RBN invested in this waste collection programme to ensure a clean and healthy environment for the community.

The system which integrates waste reduction, collection, transport, storage, treatment and disposal or recycling was implemented and the community is starting to enjoy its benefits.

Reotshepile Tlhapane, Manager of Environment, said participation in the service has improved but they are still encouraging communities to dispose of their waste in a responsible manner.

"Avoid burning of general and garden waste as it has a negative impact on the environment. This often leads to bushfires which destroy valuable grazing for livestock", she said.

As part of its education and awareness programme, the department has distributed pamphlets that guide the communities how to sort their waste at the source to reduce the amount of waste in the landfill.

"If we recycle as much as possible we can reduce the amount of waste going into the landfill which will expand the life span of the landfill and reduce the impact on the environment".

In addition to the three trucks that are collecting waste within the villages, Tlhapane said they have added two skip trucks to collect waste from the 21 skip bins distributed around the villages in which community members can place any waste that cannot be included in their plastic bags.

She said that the types of waste that should be placed in these skips are garden waste and building rubble and that no food, or dead animals should be placed inside the bins.

She also appealed to the

members of the community not make fires in the skips as this will damage them.

To further ensure the success of the programme, the department will embark on phase II of the programme which involves training, expected to be up and running in the first quarter of 2012.

Tlhapane said since they realize the importance of community involvement, members of the community, will be invited, through *makgotla*, to take part in the training which will be conducted in conjunction with Tedcor, a Waste Management Company, contracted to assist in the collection of household waste and training of local contractors.

As Royal Bafokeng Administration is doing all that it can to keep Bafokeng villages clean, healthy and neat, it is important for every member of the community to participate by helping to keep their environment clean, concluded Tlhapane.

His wealth of experience will hopefully become an inspiration to many young people.

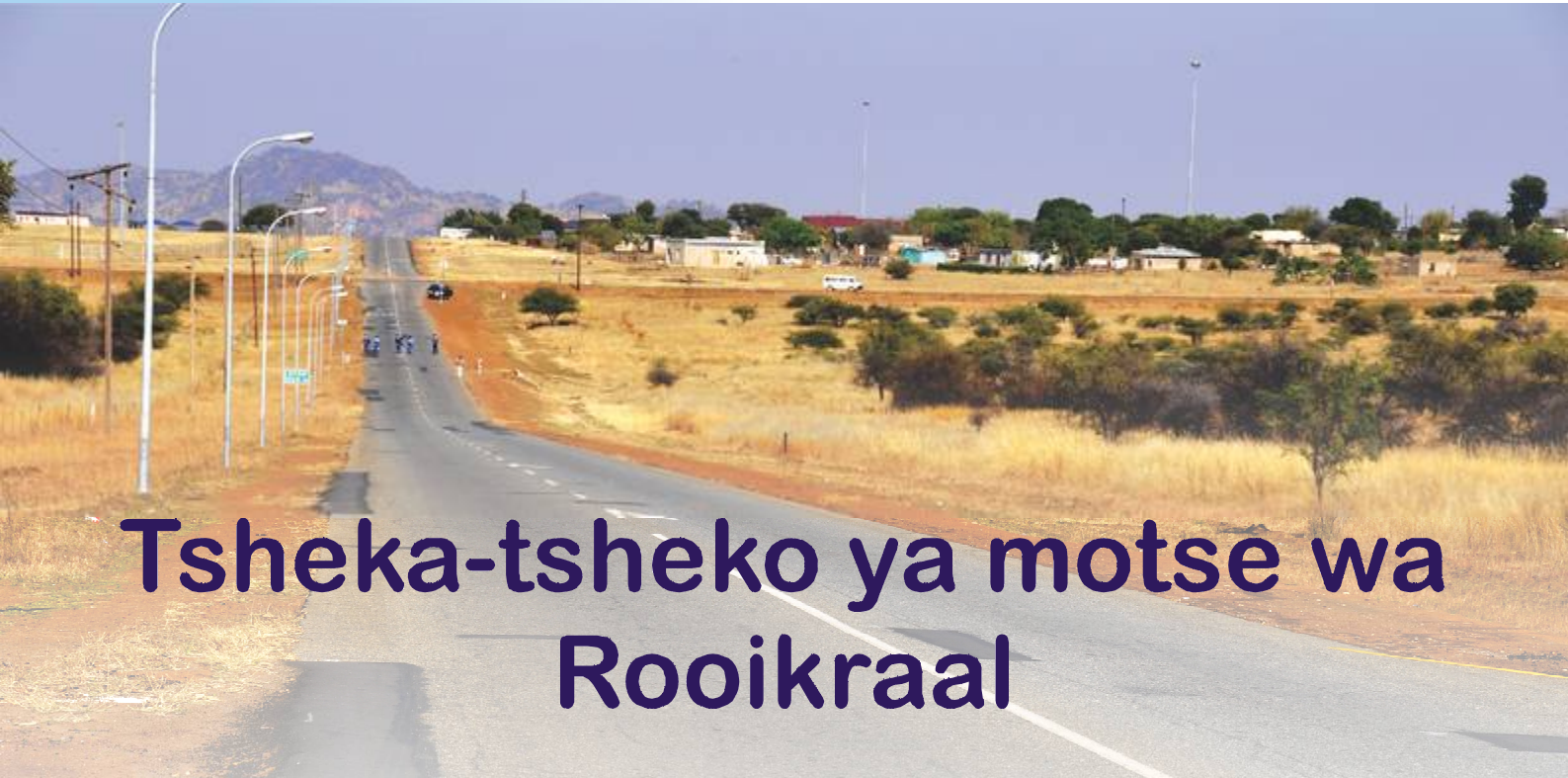
